Peterson Retires From Michigan

Marvin W. Peterson, professor of higher education at the Center for the Study of Higher and Postsecondary Education at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, retired this year.

A member since 1970, Peterson has served SCUP in a variety of volunteer leadership positions, including as president from 1987–88. His contributions to the society were so great that, in 1991, the society recognized him for his accomplishments and service by awarding both the SCUP Founders’ (Casey) Award for Distinguished Achievement in Higher Education Planning and the SCUP Distinguished Service Award at the same time, a circumstance that has not happened before or since at SCUP. He has also served as president of the Association for the Study of Higher Education (ASHE) and the Association for Institutional Research (AIR) and received their top recognition awards.

In 1980, Peterson graciously shared the time of his administrative assistant, **Joanne MacRae**, so that SCUP could move to its new, permanent home at the U of M School of Education. MacRae eventually became the managing editor of SCUP’s journal, *Planning for Higher Education* (PHE), and director of the society. In the years since SCUP found its U of M home, many of Peterson’s

graduate students have completed their doctorates and become members and volunteer leaders in the society.

A prolific writer, Peterson wrote for many national and international higher education journals and magazines, including several important articles for SCUP’s PHE journal. In addition, he has served on the journal’s Editorial Review Board.

Peterson has served as a global ambassador for SCUP and planning excellence for nearly 40 years. For this, the SCUP Board of Directors expressed their gratitude, presenting him with a plaque at his retirement reception.

It is the board’s fondest wish that Peterson—and other retired SCUPers like him—continue to support the society and share his (their) knowledge of planning with the next generation of higher education planners.

SCUP mourns the death of **Charles R. Sundin**, a veteran Houston architect with 43 years of experience, of cancer in March 2008. A graduate of the University of Houston’s College of Architecture, Sundin was active in SCUP, the American Institute of Architects (AIA), and the Texas Society of Architects (TSA). He

received numerous awards during his life, including an American Institute of Architects Medal of Excellence, several TSA honor awards for religious and educational projects, and recognition from the Texas Association of School Boards and Administrators (TASBA) for K–12 projects.

Awards & Recognition

The SCUP Awards Committee continues to grow an exciting program. Here are the highlights:

- The 2008 Call for Entries for the SCUP Founders' Award contained new criteria and requirements, including letters of recommendation, to ensure an expansive profile of the nominees' lifelong contributions to higher education.
- The 2008 SCUP/AIA-CAE Excellence in Planning, Landscape Architecture, and Architecture Awards program also continues to grow. With nine categories for submittal, we received a record number of entries this year. The jury (**pictured above**) was impressed with the entries and identified trends, which will be highlighted during the SCUP-43 concurrent session, as well as in the September–December issue of *Planning for Higher Education*. Watch for coverage on the awards page on SCUP's website.
- The committee also is developing a new award that will focus on institutional integrated and innovative planning, which they will present to the board of directors in proposal form in July.
- Best practices and lessons learned from the award submittals will be featured in presentations, articles, case studies, and programming in the coming months.
- Both the Distinguished Service and Founders' award recipients will be interviewed. SCUP will share their insights and lessons learned during their careers.
- The awards committee and SCUP staff are collectively working to enhance current programs, provide new recognition opportunities in alignment with the society's mission, strengthen relationships with allied professional societies, and, most importantly, enhance learning opportunities for SCUP members.
- The committee is advocating for greater recognition of projects, people, and processes that advance academic learning and illustrate integrated programming and planning methodologies that challenge existing paradigms.

Business & Updates

February 2008 Committee Meetings

During a snowy weekend in early February, several committees, the sponsorship coordinators group, and the board of directors met in Ann Arbor, MI, to further their work. Attached are highlights of the weekend meetings:

- **Tom Longin**, PHE executive editor, **Claire Turcotte**, managing editor, and **Terry Calhoun**, SCUP director of media relations and publications, began planning for a transition for a new executive editor. Longin will conclude his term of service in October 2009. With quality as a foundational theme for the journal, the group will explore future options and PHE's alignment with SCUP's Strategic Plan.
- Regional sponsorship coordinators had a productive exchange during their first face-to-face meeting. They shared strategies from their respective regions and formulated a collective financial goal.
- Regional representatives shared preliminary plans for upcoming activities and discussed resource implications. They met with the SCUP Professional Development Committee (PDC) to explore program linkages.

- The PDC discussed curriculum planning processes for two new SCUP workshops and the upcoming curriculum review of the planning institute, which was launched four years ago. The PDC met with the SCUP Awards Committee to consider drawing on award-winning projects as educational case studies in other venues.
- SCUP Membership Committee discussions focused on increasing member value and participation. Initiatives include bringing the successful "New Member Orientation" to regional conferences and refining the work of the year-old Member Relations Team. The committee also addressed its role in providing dues recommendations to the board of directors and formulated a proposal to the board.
- A new task force has been appointed by the board to review SCUP's nominations and elections processes. The task force is chaired by **Jaime Garrido**, SCUP at-large director.

April 2008 Board of Directors' Meeting

The board of directors met in Ann Arbor, MI, April 18–19. Here are the highlights of that meeting:

- The five regional representatives met on Thursday evening with key staff at the SCUP office to discuss regional programming, finances, and policies.
- **Alexandria Roe**, SCUP director-at large, who serves as liaison to the SCUP Awards Committee, reported that **Pamela Palmer Delphenich**, director of campus planning and design at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in Cambridge, MA, will serve as chair of the committee and **Mark Maves**, associate principal, Ayers Saint Gross in Baltimore, MD, will serve as jury chair beginning in July. She also reported that SCUP received a record 169 entries for this year's SCUP/AIA-CAE Awards Program.
- The board reviewed financial statements for the current fiscal year, discussed preliminary budget proposals for FY08–09, and accepted the FY06–07 report submitted by SCUP's external auditors.
- **Bill Flynn**, chair of the SCUP Membership Committee, reported a steady growth in membership.
- The board confirmed **John McGuire**, currently Pacific membership coordinator to the membership committee, as the incoming vice chair of that same committee beginning in July.

- **Leslie Louden**, current vice chair of the membership committee and chair of the SCUP Volunteerism Task Force, reported on the work of the task force. She will present a report to the board in July on how SCUP can strengthen its volunteer program.
- The board accepted the awards committee's recommendation of the 2008 Founders' (Casey) Award recipient and selected this year's SCUP Distinguished Service Award recipient (to be announced in an upcoming issue of *SCUP Email News*).
- A policy on setting dues in three-year cycles to support budgeting was adopted by the board.
- The board accepted a policy on how SCUP will honor member achievements, such as retirements or memorial recognition.
- **Marc Johns**, SCUP associate director of information services and systems architecture, provided an update on SCUP's technology capabilities and fielded questions from board members.

South Africa, Madagascar, and Afghanistan. Hayward reports tremendous feedback from his article and plans to join us in Montréal as a concurrent presenter.

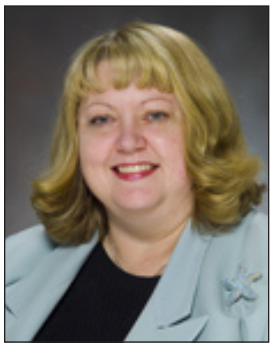
Also in this issue of PHE, authors from the University of North Carolina write about “Jobs on the Move” and the implications for US higher

Regional News

The SCUP regions enjoyed a very successful spring.

January

The Mid-Atlantic region kicked off the year January 11 with a one-day conference, titled “Creative Strategies, Collaborative Choices: Moving Campuses Forward,” at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA. It attracted 88 attendees.

February

There were two more extremely successful one-day events. On Valentine’s Day, the Southern region hosted a metro mini at Emory University in Atlanta, titled “Sustainability: Simple Steps for a Complex Issue,” which drew 93 people. The next day in Los Angeles, CA, the Pacific region hosted a symposium at the University of Southern California,

titled “Planning & Building New Within an Historic Campus Context,” which attracted 50 people.

March

The regions hosted three events. The Mid-Atlantic region held their annual regional conference in Pittsburgh, PA, at the Omni William Penn. Titled “Stitching the Campus Quilt,” the conference brought 196 people together to learn and network. Ten days later, the North Atlantic region held their annual regional conference in New Haven, CT, at Yale and Quinnipiac Universities. “Campus Community World: New Initiatives, New Directions, New Relationships” welcomed 302 attendees. On the opposite coast in mid-March, the Pacific region held another symposium, titled “Historic Context: Campus Growth in the 21st Century,” which brought 57 people to the campus of Stanford University.

April

This month brings the regional event season to a close. In Vancouver, BC the Pacific region held their annual conference at the Hyatt Regency titled “Institutional Responses to a Transforming Student Body,” which drew 272 people. The Southern region hosted a metro mini at Southern Methodist University on April 24 titled “Planning for a Sustainable Campus.” Some 33 people pre-registered.

Fiscal Round-Up

During this fiscal year (Oct. 2007–Sept. 2008), the regions held 12 events, up from seven during the last fiscal year.

These 12 events will have served nearly 1,600 members and guests, up from 1,077 during the last fiscal year and more than the record-breaking 1,557 served at SCUP’s annual, international conference last summer!
