Call for Proposals Closed

The call for concurrent session and workshop proposals for the July annual, international conference closed on October 1, with more than 150 submittals. The proposals were reviewed by members of SCUP's planning academies in October and then finalized by the SCUP-43 Conference Planning Committee recently, according to **Kathy Benton**, SCUP associate director for education and product development. "We thank everyone who submitted a proposal. It's the presenters' work that members and others come to hear and learn from at the annual conference every year.

"We also recognize that hard work and good ideas go into these proposals and that many exceptional submissions cannot be accepted each year because of the limited number of time slots we have for concurrent sessions at the conference and the need to provide a diverse topical program," Benton continued.

"We are developing ways to tap the knowledge of the individuals and groups who submit proposals in order to give them opportunities to participate in SCUP and share their ideas by writing articles for the journal, presenting at regional conferences, and many other ways."

In the meantime, Benton added, watch for upcoming announcements about the plenary speakers.

Awards & Recognition

The SCUP Awards Committee and SCUP staff are collectively working to enhance current programs, provide new recognition opportunities in alignment with the society's mission, strengthen relationships with allied professional societies, and most importantly, working to enhance learning opportunities for SCUP members. The committee is also advocating for greater recognition of projects, people, and processes that advance academic learning and that illustrate integrated programming and planning methodologies that challenge existing paradigms. This recognition will occur through modified award criteria and possibly the creation of a new award focusing on institutional innovation relative to integrated planning.

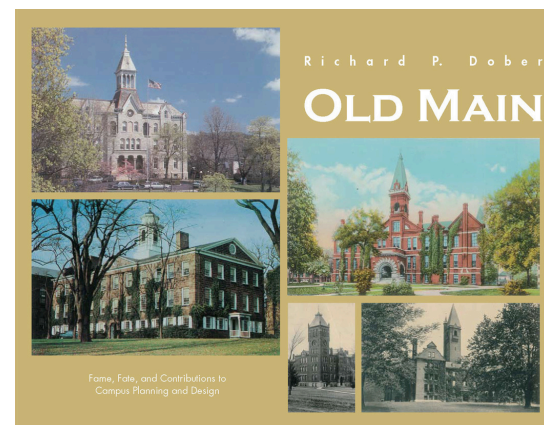
For the first time, the SCUP/AIA-CAE Awards utilized an electronic submittal format. Considered a success overall, certain aspects of the process are still being refined. This year's awards jurors noted that the new call for entries provided good information for evaluating projects and made the review process more efficient. While entrants continue to request commentary on individual submittals, this can only be provided for the top candidates due to the large number of entries. This also was the first year for an award specific to landscape architecture and future efforts will look to expand this category as appropriate.

The Founders' (Casey) Award call for nominations has been retooled to provide more consistent and targeted material for use in evaluating applicants. The committee would like the recipient to provide an educational event through either a concurrent session or interview so that the membership can learn more about this person's contributions and their career experiences. This outreach will be beneficial in mentoring less experienced SCUP members.

Enhanced learning opportunities are being achieved through: (1) incorporating the award ceremony into a concurrent session at the annual, international conference highlighting new ideas, trends, and lessons learned; (2) featuring a section in *Planning for Higher Education* journal to provide greater specifics regarding award winners; and, (3) working more closely with the SCUP Professional Development Committee on identifying how the awards program can provide new learning opportunities for SCUP members.

Business & Updates

Highlights of November 2–3, 2007, Board Meeting:

- The SCUP Strategic Plan was a primary focus of this meeting. The board selected strategic priorities that will guide programs and initiatives over the next two or three years.
- One outcome of the strategic plan discussion was a slightly revised mission statement: “The Society for College and University Planning is *a community that provides its members with the knowledge and resources to establish and achieve institutional planning goals within the context of best practices and emerging trends.*”
- The board used a new book, “The 7 Measures of Success: What Remarkable Associations Do That Others Don’t” as a guide for a discussion on what SCUP does well, what we are known for, and what we may need to investigate. Overall the board is focused on keeping the society relevant to its members and other constituents.
- The board also discussed members’ interest in global issues that are shaping higher education. While SCUP is not an international organization, the board recognizes that many members are interested in learning about how to expand globally or unique approaches to planning from peers in other countries.
- The board reviewed the society’s budget for fiscal year 2006–07, which ended September 30. Fiscal Year 2006–07 is projected to close with \$3.67M in revenues and \$3.85M in expenses, with a net deficit of \$180K for the year as compared to a budgeted deficit for FY06–07 of \$52K. SCUP’s ending fund balance for the year is projected to be approximately \$765K, exceeding the board-targeted minimum by \$101K. The board’s direction was to budget aggressively for FY06–07 to ensure that resources were allocated to important strategic initiatives. Even with a five percent increase in membership and record attendance at SCUP–42, total revenues are projected to fall short of budget by about three (3) percent, and total expenses will exceed budget by .3 percent.
- Moving forward, adjustments in selected areas have already been made to FY07–08; however, cutbacks will not affect the quality of programming or member benefits.

- The board discussed work underway by the nominating committee and provided guidance on criteria for assembling this year’s slate of candidates. Factors include passion for SCUP, ability to make a time commitment, specific expertise related to current priorities, and contribution to an overall balance that reflects the complexion of SCUP membership.
- The board also received an update on the activities of the SCUP Awards Committee; a collaboration on webcasts with the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) and *The New York Times* Knowledge Network, and on a grant received from The Getty Foundation (*Note: see the “Collaborations” section of this newsletter for more information on the webcasts and The Getty Foundation collaboration.*)

SCUP Receives Getty Grant

SCUP has been asked by The Getty Foundation to assist in an effort to understand how best to utilize the results gathered from their Campus Heritage Grants Program to better inform the campus heritage preservation and planning community.

Between 2002 and 2007, The Getty Foundation provided about 85 campus-based grants for a variety of heritage planning activities about individual school buildings, landscapes, and campus sites. These activities include identifying heritage sites, documentation, maintenance schedules, training, and development of planning activities. The Getty wants to ensure that the information learned from these activities is developed into a valuable body of knowledge and useful tools for campus planners, architects, and other interested parties, and is looking to SCUP to help find a way to share this information.
