SCUP Business & Updates

SCUP Board of Directors Meeting in Alexandria, VA

In October 2005, the SCUP Board of Directors met in Alexandria, VA. While routine SCUP business was attended to by the board, the meeting was different in several ways:

- SCUP preceded the meeting by hosting a reception in downtown Washington, DC, in the building that houses the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges (NASULGC). The purpose of the reception, which was a first for SCUP, was to bring together a diverse group of SCUP partners and nonprofit leaders who support higher education, as well as to increase awareness of SCUP. The reception was well attended and several attendees inquired if SCUP would host another reception in the future.
- The first day of the board meeting was a retreat focused on leadership development. Facilitator **Bud Crouch** of Tecker Consulting had the board focus on a single issue: *What does SCUP need to do to be more relevant to community colleges (and two-year schools) in terms of both current and prospective members?* At the end of the day, SCUP had a list of practical ideas for future implementation.
- In attendance at the meeting was SCUP's first guest director, **John Hammang**, director of special projects and development at American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU).

SCUP Academy Changes Name

SCUP's Institutional Decision-Making and Resource Planning (IDMRP) Academy has changed its name to the Resource and Budget Planning (RBP) Academy. **John ("Jake") Julia**, assistant vice president, office of change management, at Northwestern University in Evanston, IL, serves as its convener.

Board Approves New Annual Conference Policies, Guidelines

Recommendations from the SCUP Annual Conference Task Force were reviewed and approved as policies and guidelines by the board of directors at their October meeting. The policies and guidelines clarifies, for example, who serves on the SCUP Annual Conference Committee and how the vice chair of the committee is selected:

- The committee will consist of the annual conference chair, the annual conference vice chair, local hosts chair, three planning academy conveners (one from each academy), pre-conference workshop chair (from the SCUP Professional Development Committee, or PDC), the PDC chair (ex officio), SCUP's president (ex officio), and SCUP staff representatives.
- The annual conference vice chair will be selected by a leadership group consisting of the current SCUP president, the president-elect, and the SCUP executive director.
- The annual conference vice chair will serve for one year and rotate into the position of annual conference chair the following year. The vice chair's role will be to oversee the selection of the plenary speakers and "invited sessions," which are sessions where the speaker is invited to address a topic important to higher education (everyone is free to attend).

The task force also reviewed several years of annual conference evaluations completed by members and non-member attendees and made recommendations for changes to the agenda of the annual conference based on those evaluations. The board accepted them. Highlights include:

- The annual conference will return to a full day of programming on Tuesday to encourage more people to stay through Wednesday and the closing plenary speech.
- Conference programs and structured meetings, such as committee meetings, will end no later than 4:30 PM on Monday and Tuesday to allow for networking. The Idea Marketplace, however, has the option to remain open beyond 4:30 PM.
- The closing plenary and conference program will not extend past 2:00 PM on Wednesday so that conference attendees can enjoy the closing plenary and catch a late afternoon flight home.

Registrations Climb for Joint Conference in Honolulu

Here is an update on the 2006 APPA-NACUBO-SCUP joint conference, “Campus of the Future: A Meeting of the Minds,” which will be held at the Honolulu Convention Center July 8–11, 2006:

- Pulitzer Prize-winning *New York Times* foreign affairs columnist **Tom Friedman** will serve as a plenary speaker on Monday, July 10. He will talk about the impact of globalization on higher education. His most recent book, *The World is Flat: A Brief History of the Twenty-First Century*, is on the NYT bestseller’s list.
- **Tim Sanders**, former Chief Solutions Officer for Yahoo! and author of *The Likeability Factor: How to Boost Your L-Factor and Achieve Your Life's Dreams*, will offer his perspective on how higher education creates today and tomorrow's civic society on Tuesday, July 11.
- Registration opened mid-September with 95 people registering the first day, including nine team registrations.
- As of 12/19/2005, there are more than 700 registrants, which is higher than normal this many months out from the conference.
- The first and second call for concurrent session and workshop proposals generated more than 600 submissions. Letters notifying individuals of acceptance or declination of their proposals were mailed out at the end of November. - Members from all three host associations reviewed the 600-plus submittals and selected 160 of them to be concurrent sessions and 12 to be workshops, including an offering of Step I of the SCUP Planning Institute.
- **Steve Steele**, director of the Institute for the Future @ Anne Arundel Community College (IF@AACC) in Arnold, MD, is designing an interactive session for conference attendees to follow the Futures Panel on Monday morning. Attendees will break into discussion groups based on Carnegie communities and each group will develop scenarios on the issues they see as primary to their future



success. The results of this work will be compiled and reported back to attendees just prior to Sander's closing plenary on Tuesday. These Carnegie-based group discussions will be facilitated by members of the National Consortium for Continuous Improvement in Higher Education (NCCI).

- Plans are underway to showcase “the residence hall of the future” in the Campus Expo. There are discussions with vendors and experts to create a “learning space of the future” as well.

Annual Conference Location for 2010 Announced

Minneapolis, MN, will be the site of SCUP–45, the society's annual international conference and idea marketplace. The conference will be held July 10–14, 2010, at the Minneapolis Convention Center. Nearby hotels in a variety of price ranges will have room blocks for attendees. A central US location was required based on an East Coast–West Coast–Central US rotation. Minneapolis was selected because of the high number of higher education institutions in the area, public transportation, mild summer weather, entertainment and cultural activities, and its convenient airport hub. Campus Sustainability Day III

SCUP's third annual Campus Sustainability Day, titled “A (recycled, of course) Six Pack of Sustainability Lessons From the Past Year in Higher Education,” was held October 26, 2005, with 131 sites representing more than 2,000 participants. SCUP garnered endorsements from 20 organizations, including *University Business* magazine, and sponsorships from Gilbane Higher Education, Herman Miller, Itron, and Sasaki. A white paper, *We Rise to Play a Greater Part: Students, Faculty, Staff and Community Converge in Search of Leadership From the Top*, was written by **Terry Calhoun**, SCUP director of media relations and publications, with assistance from the Sustainability Advice and Review Panel, and transmitted to members and thousands of non-members in preparation for the day. SCUP Introduces Two New Dues Groups for Community Colleges/System Offices and Small Corporate Offices

The SCUP Membership Committee announced the formation of two new dues groups, which are available as of January 1, 2006:

- Both of the new dues groups provide privileges for three memberships, plus the option to add on up to three additional memberships.
- Both are available at a dues rate of \$530 annually.
- The first new dues group, called "Institutional Group F," serves the needs of professionals at community colleges and system offices.
- The second new dues group, called "Non-Institutional/Corporate Group—Small," serves smaller corporate offices, nonprofit associations, government offices, and other "non-institutional" entities.
- SCUP will continue to offer all other dues groups (A to E), including the six-member group for corporate and non-institutional professionals, which is now to be called "Non-Institutional Group—Large."

Soon after Hurricane Katrina hit, SCUP created a listserv to help higher education institutions announce offers to hurricane-affected students and faculty. SCUP member **Patricia Gustavson**, vice president for finance and administration at John Brown University in Siloam Springs, AR, wrote a note of thanks that made the SCUP board and staff feel very proud:

"There were many heroes in this latest disaster to affect us all, and there will be more in the days and months to come, but "My Hero" is . . . [SCUP]. You saw an immediate need, jumped in and ran with it. Eventually others came along and provided more

organization, appropriate protocols, got permission, etc., but SCUP stood in the breach for all of us as we tried to find meaningful ways to grapple with an overwhelming situation . . . Thanks, **Jolene [Knapp]**, SCUP's executive director, for volunteering SCUP to support a purely spontaneous outreach of concern and assistance. Other associations may have had the same or better resources, or may have had more of a "mandate" to provide the needed services, but SCUP stepped out and filled a void. Now that others are shaping their agendas and fulfilling their proper roles, SCUP is gladly stepping back within its 'levees.' But I greatly appreciate the fact that you saw the need for communication among campuses and displaced students and gave those of us who are not as technologically literate as you are the mechanism for reaching each other quickly."
